Wight Building Materials opens new £3.5 million asphalt plant

The new asphalt plant at Blackwater Quarry was officially opened by Andrew Turner MP on Friday 1st August. Clients, local councillors and the press, together with employees from Wight Building Materials, were invited to attend the opening and given an opportunity to tour the plant.

The new plant is quieter, cleaner and more efficient to the benefit of residents, the environment and the Island's road network. Local Island minerals will be used within the asphalt production, as well as incorporating recycled asphalt, to ensure high quality and environmentally friendly road material.

The opening of the plant is a welcome development for Island Roads as it will provide much of the materials required to upgrade the Island highways as well as other future general infrastructure projects.

With the plant now up and running, surfacing schemes across the Island are already benefiting.

Another visit to the plant was also arranged after the launch at the request of Cllr. John Hobart. He and other councillors and the Chair for the IOW Bridleway group Tricia Merrifield attended and found the visit extremely useful and informative.

Wroxall Scout Hut

An overgrown amenity area outside Wroxall Scout Hut has been brought back into use thanks to Island Roads staff.

Following a plea for help from scout leader Azwar Zahoor, a work gang of Island Road employees spent a day clearing the overgrown area under the company's employee volunteering scheme.

Nine Island Roads staff lead by Shane Hall joined Azwar in the clear up operation to make the area safe and suitable for scouts, cubs and beavers to undertake a range of activities including camping, sports and other adventure activity.

As well as the manpower, Island Roads also provided the tools to allow the team to do the work.

Shane explained: "The Scout hut has been maintained and run by Azwar for many years but after a serious accident he found it difficult to keep the area under control.

"Azwar requested assistance from Island Roads as the situation had become so bad that the area was unusable as it was too dangerous due to fly-tipped objects and brambles.



"We were delighted to help out and two of our district responders joined members of the finance team to undertake various tasks including cutting grass, brambles, hedges, and trees and we also shovelled mud and brick, cleared footways, removed illegally tipped tiles and other general waste.

"The team did a fantastic job and achieved more than I had hoped for, and they all did it with a smile on their face."

Azwar said: "It was great to work alongside Island Roads staff. Because

of their efforts we have brought back into use an amenity area for young people in the village. I would like to thank all the staff who gave up their time and also to Island Roads for allowing them to spend the time helping us out through their volunteering programme."

Undercliff Drive

Much has been written in the local media of late about the on-going situation at Undercliff Drive following the landslip earlier this year although of course it is an issue that has been in the news for centuries – it was even featured in a Pathé News Reel from 1926.

The Isle of Wight has an international reputation as an area with unique and volatile geological features. With 15 sites of Special Scientific Interest on the Island, it has been a Mecca for geological studies since the early 1800s. In more recent years, the Island played host to an international conference (2007) on climate change with experts from across the globe visiting many sites, including the Undercliff, to view first-hand the impact of climate change both on the

coastal area and inland.

The site at the Undercliff is the most well known of these and has for centuries been the subject of significant ground movement and landslides, with over 300 reported incidents having occurred there. This historical situation, compounded by one of the wettest winters on record, caused further ground movement not just here but right across the Island.

There have been allegations in the media that the work being undertaken on the site to tackle the surface issues and not the surrounding geological conditions somehow played a part in contributing to the landslide however there is absolutely no evidence that this was the case and much more

evidence that the combination of groundwater levels and deep underlying instability was the cause of the landslip.

We do however appreciate that this is a very difficult time for the residents affected and sympathise greatly with their on-going circumstances and continue to work with the Isle of Wight Council both to monitor ground conditions and to identify options to re-establish access to these properties.

This is a complex and lengthy process, made more difficult by site access issues and continuing ground movement, but we are endeavouring to do all we can to assist the council to reach a decision around the future of this road as quickly as possible.

Facebook site helps re-unite feline road fatalities with owners

The Facebook site Isle of Wight Lost Pets has teamed up with Island Roads to help ensure cats killed on the highway network can be returned to their owners.

Under the highways PFI, Island Roads is contracted to collect dead animals including pets from the roadside.

Since April last year, more than 70 cats have been retrieved but because so few are micro-chipped it had proved extremely difficult to trace the owners.

However Island Roads approached the Isle of Wight Lost Pets Facebook page which carries a regularly updated gallery of missing pets. Unfortunately a number of these are the victims of road accidents and the two organisations now work closely together to identify animals based on the information – including photographs – provided to the site by owners.

Shirleyann Jones, a volunteer who helps manage the page, said: "Losing a cat is an awful experience for any owner to go through and often the worse thing is simply not knowing what has happened to their pet

"While being re-united with a deceased pet is in itself traumatic it at least gives the owner a sense of closure and enables them to make their own arrangements for saying goodbye to their cat.

"I can only thank Island Roads for teaming with us and making this special extra effort to re-unite cats with their owners. It shows they are very committed to being part of the Island community.

"So far our partnership has enabled ten owners to retrieve their animals while only four have been returned because they have been microchipped."



Upgrade for popular shared route

Works to upgrade a well used public route near Ryde have been completed in partnership with Island Roads.

Using money secured under the government's Local Sustainable Transport Fund (LSTF), more than £130,000 has been spent improving the route that runs between Fishbourne Lane and Quarr Road, Binstead. It is part of the overall project to create a safe, traffic free and well surfaced route between Ryde and Newport.

The old stone and gravel route has been replaced with a cement-bound base overlaid with a surface dressing that is in keeping with the rural setting of the area. The new route is now suitable for walkers, cyclists, horse riders, wheelchair users and people with push-buggies. New gates at either end of the route have also been installed.

With Quarr Abbey undergoing its own refurbishment recently, the council also worked very closely with the abbey and with Island Roads, which carried out the improvements on the route, to ensure any disruption during works was kept to a minimum.

Councillor Luisa Hillard, Executive member for sustainability, environment and public realm, said: "I am very pleased to see this latest shared route finished and it is a testament to the hard work done by officers.

"With Quarr Abbey itself also recently undergoing refurbishment works using Heritage Lottery funds, the upgraded route from Ryde provides





improved opportunities for visitors to the abbey without needing to use a car."

Councillor Shirley Smart, Executive member for economy and tourism, said: "This route is well used and is popular with residents and tourists alike. The old route was in need of upgrading and I am delighted these excellent improvements have been carried out which means the route can be enjoyed by so many people including walkers, cyclists and horse riders."

The Isle of Wight Council was recently informed its latest bid for funding under the government's next round of LSTF money has been accepted. The council will find out in the autumn how much it will receive, having put in a bid for just under £1 million pounds of revenue funding.

Improvements of a similar nature have also been made to a shared path between Wroxall and Shanklin and work started at the end of July on the shared surface between Newport and Medina Harbour.
