Medina College Maths Challenge

On Tuesday 25th November Medina College offered an information evening for students and their parents in years 8 and 9. This was a joint event co-ordinated by extended services & careers to help develop some early interest in different career opportunities and linking this to the understanding of priorities for learning and social and personal knowledge, relevant to the maturing teenager.

Students and their parents were given the opportunity to attend two workshops over the course of the evening covering different areas of industry ranging from careers in the police and NHS through to banking and the different armed forces to businesses such as Yokogawa Marex Ltd and BAE Systems.

The workshops were very interactive allowing for lots of information, questions and answers to help students begin to think about which direction they may wish to follow and the types of opportunities they may want to explore in the future.

As part of the evening there was also an opportunity to visit various information stands linked to the workshops and to external support agencies. These included Portsmouth University, Smart, HTP and Care Learning, Police, Army, Navy, IW College, Youth Trust, NHS & NHS Outreach sexual health service, School Pastors and Parents Voice.

This was a really well attended event with around 300 students and parents taking part. The evening had a very relaxed and friendly atmosphere and overall was felt to be an ideal way of promoting aspirations about career opportunities.
