
Dear parents, carers and children,




I hope everyone has a wonderful weekend and I look forward to seeing everyone on Monday morning.


School Dinners

Let's talk school attendance

Our current whole school attendance is 95.48%. This is below the **Government expectation of 96%**. In light of this we will be taking a much more rigorous and robust approach to attendance and lateness as of Monday 29th November. At Brighstone Primary School we have high expectations and so we would like our average to be above 96.5%.

A reminder that children should attend school if they are well enough to do so. **Medical appointments** should be made outside of school hours. As you will see on the next page, absences add up to lost learning time and missed opportunities.

We will be doing **weekly checks** (instead of termly) on **individual attendance** percentages and **late marks** of pupils, and families whose child's attendance is causing concern will be invited to attend attendance meetings with the Headteacher and Family Liaison Officer so that we can work together to improve attendance.

We know that your child's attendance is important to you too and that there are occasions when children really are too poorly to attend school. However, **persistent absence (below 90%)** will be referred to Education Welfare and could result in a Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN) being issued.

A reminder that <u>illness should always be reported to the school office by 8.30am</u> every morning your child is absent from school and followed up by an email explaining the absence so that it can be authorised. We would also like to remind you that **holidays** during term time are not authorised and will be referred to Education Welfare which could result in a FPN.

Why good attendance matters


Regular school attendance is an important part of giving children the best possible start in life. The aim should be to attend 100% of the time.

Students who miss school frequently can fall behind with their work and do less well in exams. Good attendance also shows potential employers that a young person is reliable.

Research suggests that students who attend school regularly could also be at less risk of getting involved in antisocial behaviour or crime. Below is a table showing how children's percentage attendance equates to the amount of school time missed.

Attendance during one school year	Equivalent Days	Equivalent Sessions	Equivalent Weeks	Equivalent Lessons Missed
95%	9 Days	18 Sessions	2 Weeks	54 Lessons
90%	19 Days	38 Sessions	4 Weeks	114 Lessons

It is also important to arrive at school on time. If a child arrives late to school every day, their learning begins to suffer. Below is a graph showing how being late to school every day over a school year adds up to lost learning time over one academic year.
