### Re: Year 2 - Relationships and Sex Education

As part of the school's Relationships and Sex Education (RSE) programme, children in Year R to Year 6 all receive approximately three age-appropriate lessons on ourselves, families, relationships, sexual health and personal safety. These lessons take place in the second half of the summer term.

The programme of learning is based upon 'The Christopher Winter Project' that is being used by many schools on the island and across the UK, and its purpose, which will be presented in a sensitive, objective and balanced manner, is to help in the development of making safe choices, building self-esteem and healthy and responsible relationships with others. This programme has now operated for a number of years and has been well received by both parents and children. This is also closely linked to 'Jigsaw' that we use for our Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE) lessons.

The programme for Year 2 pupils is 'Differences'. A copy of the scheme of work is available on the back of this letter. If you would like to view the detailed programme of learning or have any queries that you would like to discuss individually, please contact your child's class teacher or myself who will be happy to answer any questions you may have. In addition, the school's PSHE, Relationships and Sex Education policy is on our school website.

From September 2020, parents do not have the right to excuse their children from relationships education. However, parents have the right to excuse their children from the non-statutory/non-science components of sex education within RSE. We would strongly urge parents to allow their child to participate, as it is likely that children will discuss the lessons and we feel that it is better for children to hear directly from the class teacher, rather than acquiring partial or inaccurate information from one another. Your child may also ask questions at home.

Requests for being excused should be put in writing by **Friday 9<sup>th</sup> June 2023** using the form found in Appendix 6 of the PSHE, Relationships and Sex Education policy and addressed to the headteacher (if you would like a copy of this form sent to you, please inform the office). I will discuss the request with parents before making an appropriate decision. A copy of these requests will be placed in the pupil's educational record. Alternative work will be given to pupils who are excused from aspects of relationships and sex education.
