Dear parents, carers and children,



Welcome back to the new school year! It was a delight to see everyone's smiling faces on Wednesday morning, and all the children have settled back really well. I would like to say a warm welcome to all of our new Reception children as well as our new children who have started in KS2. Please see p3 of this Buzz for some **reminders** about uniform and snacks etc...

Despite the rain over the last couple of days, we haven't let it dampen our spirits. In fact, we were out in the drizzle at lunchtime today, ensuring they got some fresh air, and so many children were dancing to the music as part of our Funky Friday fun! Mrs Jones and I had a discussion with them this morning about behaviour reminders, learning behaviours and safeguarding, and the behaviour around the school has been excellent. Reception Bumble Bees have been busy exploring the classroom with all the different learning areas, and many have been very creative with their paintings and dough (I en-



joyed some very tasty biscuits at the dough table!). Y1/2 Bumble Bees have been listening to the story of Elmer, and seeing which common exception words they can read and spell. As well as their usual lessons, children in Honey Bee class have been busy seeing which spellings they have remembered, and practising their handwriting. Ivy Bees have had a fantastic start to the new year, and they have shown excellent learning behaviours, and Mrs Sharp and Mrs Denness have been so pleased with the kindness and courtesy in the classroom. They've already begun fantastic pastel drawings in the style of Peter Thorpe, and tackled a few tricky fractions questions to get their brains working. 10/10 of tidiness in the classroom and very sensible behaviour.

You will have been aware, over the past few months, of the **school place planning** issue, and the Local Authority's need to close a number of schools due to surplus places and fewer pupils across the island (and nationally). Whilst we acknowledge that something has to be done, it has been a very stressful time for the island, and will continue to be so for the next year. However, we are very relieved to find out that our school has not been named for potential closure, and that it has been proposed that we create a 12-place Resourced Provision for children with speech, language and communication needs and/or Autism on our site, the first of its kind in the West Wight. Following the cabinet meeting on Thursday 12th September where the plans will be discussed, there will be the opportunity to engage in the consultation that will run from 20th September until 1st November 2024. Again, we are very relieved that we can continue to be here for our local community and the surrounding areas for many more years, but we are also mindful of the difficulties and upset that the communities of the named schools must be going through.

Today, you will have received a letter about the upcoming **parents evening**, which is earlier in the term this year. This will give teachers and parents the opportunity to talk about how their children have settled in and how we can work together to support them throughout the year.



Reminders

What a wonderful first few days back. All has gone well and children look so smart in their new uniforms. We just have a few little reminders:

- All hair accessories, socks, shoes and trainers must be in the school colours: navy blue, grey, black or white (no novelty socks)

As a school, we actively encourage reading at home for practise, enjoyment and education. To quote JK Rowling "If you don't like reading you just haven't found the right book yet".

The importance of your child reading for pleasure, or of listening to a book being read to them, cannot be underestimated:

Supported cognitive development.

Improved language skills.

Preparation for academic success (and future success in the workplace).

Developing a special bond with your child.

Increased concentration and discipline.

Improved imagination and creativity.

Cultivating a lifelong love of reading.

We are happy for children to read or listen to books from home as well as ones from school. Encouraging children to step out of their reading comfort zone can be a challenge and, whilst we encourage children to read Roald Dahl / David Walliams / Diary of a Wimpy Kid etc, reading nothing but these can place a ceiling on expanding children's interests, vocabulary and comprehension.

If you would like some inspiration on what your child could be reading (or listen to when sharing a book with a family member or friend), then the links below provide a good range of modern and classic stories over a wide range of genres.

Remember also that reading does not have to be expensive; our local libraries will stock many of the titles and there are reputable used books websites that sell good quality copies at a fraction of the new price (see below).

If you need any further persuasion on the importance of regular reading, then take a moment to take in the following:

Research conducted by the National Literacy Trust found that almost 1 in 5 young children between ages five and eight do not have their own book at home. It has also been noted that children who read at home are not only six times more likely to then be able to read above their expected level, but that reading is also linked to lots of great benefits, such as more complex vocabulary, greater emotional depth and further successes.

Respect Charter

at Brighstone CE Aided Primary School

At Brighstone CE Aided Primary School we believe staff, parents and children are entitled to a safe and protective environment in which to learn and work. We strive to ensure that our school offers a warm and nurturing environment. All members of the school community and visitors should demonstrate mutual respect, to feel safe, work together and to use restorative approaches as the foundation of our practice. Any behaviour that may lead to feelings of harassment, alarm or distress to members of our community, will not be tolerated and action taken.

Expectations

- That all adults set a good example to children at all times, showing them how to get along with all members of the school and the wider community.
- That no one staff, governors, parents, carers, volunteers or children - be subjected to abusive behaviour or any form of threats from visitors on the school premises.
- That physical attacks and threatening behaviour, abusive or insulting language verbal or written (including on social media), to staff, governors, parents, carers, volunteers, children and other users of the school premises will not be tolerated and may lead to a ban from school premises and/or police action.

Types of behaviour that are considered serious and unacceptable

This is not an exhaustive list but seeks to provide illustrations of such behaviour:

- a Shouting, either in person or over the telephone
- Speaking in an aggressive/threatening tone
- o Physically intimidating, e.g. standing very close
- The use of aggressive hand gestures/exaggerated
- Physical threats
- Shaking or holding a fist towards another person
- Swearing and name calling
- Pushing
- Slapping, punching, hitting or kicking
- Racist, homophobic or other hateful behaviour
- Sexist comments or sexual innuendo
- Disrespecting religion or belief
- Inappropriate communications (posting on Social Networking sites, emails or letters, etc.) which could bring the school into disrepute or be deemed as bullying, harassment and/or a hate-related

The school reserves the right to take any necessary actions to ensure that members of the school community are not subjected to any form of abuse in line with policy and procedure. If you choose to engage in these behaviours you may be asked to leave the site or the police may be called.
