General Information

Ivy Bee Class is now located in the Roy Bromley rooms (classroom block on the playground).

In the mornings, the field gate will be opened at **8.25am** and Ivy Bee children will be expected to come directly to the classroom via the **white double doors**; the gate will be closed by **8.30am**, so if you arrive after this time, please enter via the main office door and sign in with Mrs Pelosi in the office.

At **3pm**, Y5 and Y6 will be dismissed into the playground via the **white double doors**. Y5 & Y6 children are allowed to walk home independently if a permission slip has been completed and returned to the office.

Equipment: Children will be expected to bring their reading book, reading record and named water bottle in their school bag on a daily basis. Children do not need to bring in their own pencil cases and equipment, as everything they will need will be provided in class.

PE: PE days will be **Monday** and **Wednesday**. Children will still wear their PE kits to school on their PE days. Children will still need to wear their school jumpers if needed and, when the weather is chilly, track suit bottoms are advisable. **Earrings need to be either removed or taped up**; we do have some Micropore style tape in school, but it would be appreciated if children could bring their own tape.

Golden Worship



Golden Worship takes place in the hall on Friday mornings at 8.35am, to celebrate special achievements. The last Friday of every half term celebrates external awards and achievements.

As usual, parents/carers of recipients will be invited in to watch their child receiving their certificate; you will receive a text on the Wednesday before. Please sign in at the school office and then make your way round to the hall door via the school car park.

Homework and Reading

As reading is such a key life skill (and enjoyable), there are high expectations for all our children to read regularly. Children will be expected to read (preferably a school book but you may read a book from home, too) at least 3-4 times each week for periods of at least 10-15 minutes. Reading books can be changed on any day and reading diaries will be checked on a **Tuesday** morning. Ivy Bee children will be encouraged to choose a range of books to enjoy; some of these may be longer novels, while some may be shorter books, joke books, poetry books, graphic novels, picture books for older children, and so on.

It is important to read a wide range of genres so the **Ivy Bee Reading Challenge** is in the back of the reading record book – can it be completed before the end of the academic year?

By Years 5 & 6, most children will be fluent enough readers to read independently to themselves; however, all children benefit from reading aloud to an “audience” from time to time. Children are encouraged to complete the reading record themselves but it must be signed by an adult at home. Discussions about what has been read is just as important as the reading itself, so please make time to discuss the book – talk about if they enjoyed the book and why, whether it was funny, silly, sad, scary etc..., the plot, the characters, your child’s predictions and opinions along with any tricky or new vocabulary. It is also always beneficial for a child of any age to listen to a story being read by someone else!

If you would like some inspiration or guidance on the type of books your child might like to read, then we recommend the following links and remember, many of these books can be borrowed from local libraries (as well as our own) rather than having to purchase them.

The half-termly homework tasks will follow the same format and completion of a certain number of the tasks will be awarded with a certificate. The focus for the autumn term will be spellings followed by RE.

Additional class homework with a spellings or times table focus may also be sent home.

Year 6 tests - SATs



At the end of Key Stage 2 in May, Year 6 sit the National Tests, known as SATs, in English (reading comprehension, writing and Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar) and Maths. At this stage, we feel that the focus should be on settling the children into the new school year, but there will be a steadily increasing awareness of and preparation for them as the months progress. However, we do not wish any child to feel pressured or stressed about SATs, so please do talk to us if your child is struggling.

Attendance



At Brighstone, we expect all children to have a minimum attendance of 96.5% and to start the school day punctually. This is key to ensure that children are settled, ready and focused for their learning that day as soon as they arrive! The field gate will be locked at 8.30am, so after that please enter school via the main entrance and sign in at the office.
