We were delighted to welcome back the Pearl of Africa Children's Choir today, who last visited in 2023. They are touring the UK to raise awareness and funds for The Molly and Paul Childcare Foundation, which is a Christian charity in Uganda. It was established in 1983 by Molly and Paul M. Wasswa for the purpose of helping disadvantaged children who are in desperate need of help and support. These vulnerable children may be orphaned, neglected, abandoned or simply living in acute poverty and are

frequently affected by the ravages of HIV/AIDS. Molly and Paul M. Wasswa are a committed Christian couple who believe that God has placed upon their hearts the desire to reach out and meet the needs of these children.

Even though the choir had reduced numbers compared with last time (due to visa difficulties), they still had huge impact! The four young people and their headteacher, Aunty Annet, performed for the whole school at the start of the day, before leading drumming and singing workshops for each class. They also did a soft and gentle performance for the children in The Nest! They ended the day with a short dance on the playground while selling their homemade jewellery and crafts. A huge thank you to Aunty Annet (headteacher), Uncle Robin (trustee), Jauhara, Veran, Ronald and Marvin.



Here are some of the class accounts of the workshops:

After the Pearl of Africa Choir workshop, the Flower Bees went back to their classroom and were all busy playing, but there was definitely more singing and energy than usual and the notes from "O şéun" could be heard coming from different areas in the room. I'm sure we will be playing with drums and beat and rhythm for the next few weeks! Honey Bee class were thrilled to watch the Pearl of Africa choir perform and we had a wonderful time singing, dancing and



drumming with them. Many of the children are very excited to be seeing the evening performance with their families, and have the opportunity to join in! We hope that they will raise lots of money for the children of Uganda.

In other news from Bumble Bee class: "We have been very busy bees in Bumble Bee Class again this week. This week, Alice recommends Northern Lights by


Philip Pullman.



Lateness

We have had the number of **children being late** creep up again this week. I understand that sometimes lateness is unavoidable, but being late has an impact:

- Being late for school isn't good because children might miss something important their teacher says.
- ♦ It can also interrupt their classmates who are already learning.
- Some children don't like the feeling when they have to walk into their class after everyone else has started and are already settled.
- Children who are frequently late may feel stressed or anxious, struggle to catch up, and develop a habit of poor attendance, which is linked to lower grades and poorer long-term outcomes.




Punctuality helps a child succeed by:

- Improving academic performance.
- Building discipline.
- Developing essential life skills like time management and responsibility.
- * Avoiding missing key information and participating more fully in class.
- Arriving feeling calm and ready to learn.
- * Building a strong work ethic that is crucial for future success in education and careers.



Please help us to improve punctuality to help your child succeed.



At Brighstone Primary School we have high expectations for our children. This begins with attendance and punctuality as they are important life skills to learn.

Good school attendance habits are best started early. Children learn from those around them and you as parents/carers set the standards and expectations for your child. Lateness has a negative impact; being late may disrupt already settled children and lessons, affect achievement and embarrass, worry or upset your child. We understand that there may be an occasional unavoidable instance where you are late, but if it happens frequently, please let us know if there may be something that we can do to help.

Reminders

Respect Charter

at Brighstone CE Aided Primary School

At Brighstone CE Aided Primary School we believe staff, parents and children are entitled to a safe and protective environment in which to learn and work. We strive to ensure that our school offers a warm and nurturing environment. All members of the school community and visitors should demonstrate mutual respect, to feel safe, work together and to use restorative approaches as the foundation of our practice. Any behaviour that may lead to feelings of harassment, alarm or distress to members of our community, will not be tolerated and action taken.

Expectations

- That all adults set a good example to children at all times, showing them how to get along with all members of the school and the wider community.
- That no one staff, governors, parents, carers, volunteers or children - be subjected to abusive behaviour or any form of threats from visitors on the school premises.
- That physical attacks and threatening behaviour, abusive or insulting language verbal or written (including on social media), to staff, governors, parents, carers, volunteers, children and other users of the school premises will not be tolerated and may lead to a ban from school premises and/or police action.

Types of behaviour that are considered serious and unacceptable

This is not an exhaustive list but seeks to provide illustrations of such behaviour:

- a Shouting, either in person or over the telephone
- Speaking in an aggressive/threatening tone
- o Physically intimidating, e.g. standing very close
- The use of aggressive hand gestures/exaggerated
- Physical threats
- Shaking or holding a fist towards another person
- Swearing and name calling
- Pushing
- Slapping, punching, hitting or kicking
- Racist, homophobic or other hateful behaviour
- Sexist comments or sexual innuendo
- Disrespecting religion or belief
- Inappropriate communications (posting on Social Networking sites, emails or letters, etc.) which could bring the school into disrepute or be deemed as bullying, harassment and/or a hate-related

The school reserves the right to take any necessary actions to ensure that members of the school community are not subjected to any form of abuse in line with policy and procedure. If you choose to engage in these behaviours you may be asked to leave the site or the police may be called.
